Meeting Minutes:

Welcome & Introductions

Chabre Vickers (Prosper Portland) shared welcoming remarks and housekeeping items. In addition to meeting logistics, Chabre reiterated meeting agreements for the CLC and its purpose for the meeting. Lastly, Chabre reviewed the agenda for the evening.

Public Official Refresh

Chabre provided a review of the rules for Public Official and training.

TIF 101 and Lessons Learned

Chabre led the CLC members and audience through the basics of TIF and its definition. Noting how a district is funded and highlighting its connection to the TIF District Plan. Chabre mapped the history of TIF and its impacts to community and where current TIF Districts reside between the Council Districts.

Funding for TIF was covered by Chabre and what it can support on the Economic Development and Affordable Housing side in addition to TIF limitations.

Chabre reviewed lessons learned in past work into the new approach to TIF in the city. While not an exhaustive list, the approach has changed how the TIF district and community engagement work together.

Chabre wrapped up the TIF 101 overview with Stabilization and Inclusive Growth model and the focus on how TIF/Urban Renewal can impact a community within the district.

CLC members and members of the public asked questions on the following topics:

- Revenue Sharing
- Food Business Support in East Portland
- Community Engagement and People Centered Work in Action Planning
- Small business support for spaces such as bars, music venues.
- Concerns of displacement
- TIF Programming to support community growth
- CLC remaining informed of other City of Portland agencies' work
- CLC engagement opportunities with Central City Working Groups

From District Plan to Action Plan

Lisa Abuaf (Prosper Portland) brought the group back to discuss District Plan to Action Plan for the CLC to understand the goals as they begin Action Planning.

Within each District Plan, there are specifically allocated funds for Economic and Urban Development, Infrastructure, and Affordable Housing as outlined in the District Plan.

Lastly, Elements of an Action Plan include Community Vision, Summary of Stakeholder Engagement, District Context & SOAR Analysis, Plan Goals, Investment Priorities, Outcomes, Measures of Success, Forecasted Budget, and Governance and Implementation. Lisa connected the elements of the Action Plan to the work ahead for the CLC.

Lisa walked the CLC through the 2026 Work Plan and the anticipated goals towards Action Planning.
