Authorizing the Creation of a Portland Small Business Relief Fund

BOARD ACTION REQUESTED AND BRIEF DESCRIPTION

Adopt Resolution No. 7363

This action by the Prosper Portland Board of Commissioners (Board) will authorize the creation of a \$2,000,000 Portland Small Business Relief Fund (Business Relief Fund) to support businesses affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. If approved, the Business Relief Fund will be administered by Prosper Portland (and, potentially, other partners) and provide a combination of grants and loans to eligible small businesses (see the Business Relief Fund Program Guidelines as Exhibit A to Resolution No. 7363).

Staff will return to the April 8, 2020 Prosper Portland Board meeting to seek authorization of i.) a revision to the agency's fiscal year (FY) 2019-20 Adopted Budget to make Enterprise Zone community contribution resources available for the Business Relief Fund, ii.) an amendment to the annual intergovernmental agreement (IGA) with the City of Portland (City) that allocated City general funds to Prosper Portland, and iii) other related emergency funding measures that may arise by that date.

STRATEGIC PLAN ALIGNMENT AND OUTCOMES

This action will deliver on Prosper Portland's Strategic Plan goals to create healthy, complete neighborhoods; provide access high quality employment; foster wealth creation within communities of color; and form 21st century civic networks, institutions, and partnerships.

BACKGROUND AND CONTEXT

The COVID-19 pandemic impact to the local business community has been rapid and devastating. As early as January 2020, Asian-owned businesses in the Jade District were reporting a reduction in business and incidents of graffiti and vandalism. Since the pandemic hit the United States, business, industry, and employees across the city of Portland have experienced unprecedented disruptions and layoffs.

In response to this crisis, on March 17, 2020, Mayor Ted Wheeler announced that Prosper Portland would deploy \$150,000 to the Asian Pacific American Network of Oregon (APANO) to assist affected businesses in the Jade District and Old Town/Chinatown. Meanwhile, Prosper Portland staff have been working with City of Portland elected officials, bureau leadership and staff, financial institutions, and local foundations to fund a much larger pot of resources that affected small businesses across the city will have the opportunity to apply for as soon as possible. The \$2,000,000 Business Relief Fund currently includes \$1,000,000 in general fund resources from the City and \$1,000,000 in Prosper Portland Enterprise Zone resources. Funds raised by financial institutions and foundations will be complementary to but are not currently included in the publicly sourced Business Relief Fund.

EQUITY IMPACT

The Business Relief Fund Program Guidelines prioritize small businesses, those owned by people of color and women, and located in traditionally underserved communities.

COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION AND FEEDBACK

Over the past two weeks, Prosper Portland staff has convened the Economic Impact Action Committee (EIAC), a group of City elected officials and staff and other business and workforce partners who meet on a daily basis to develop a coordinated response to the economic impacts of the pandemic. In addition, staff has convened the Economic Impact Task Force (Task Force), an approximately 80-member group of stakeholders that includes EIAC representatives as well as partners from the non-profit, business, workforce, and government partner communities. Both the EIAC and the Task Force have been supportive of seeding the Business Relief Fund with Prosper Portland and City resources. See a roster of the EIAC and the Task Force in Attachment A.

BUDGET AND FINANCIAL INFORMATION

As noted, the Portland City Council has committed an additional \$1,000,000 in City of Portland (City) general fund resources to Prosper Portland and Prosper Portland has identified \$1,000,000 in Enterprise Zone community contributions for the Business Relief Fund. As noted, staff will seek future Prosper Portland Board approval to amend the current FY 2019-20 Revised Budget to appropriate expenditures from contingency in the Enterprise Zone fund, and to amend the intergovernmental agreement with the City, if necessary. Prosper Portland's Financial Sustainability Plan (FSP) and FY 2020-21 Requested Budget and Five-Year Forecast anticipates the Enterprise Zone resources will supplement the Economic Development budget over the next five years to provide a level amount of programming for the Inclusive Business Resource Network, workforce, and other economic development programming. Prosper Portland has allocated those resources toward a loan product versus a grant to recover those funds to be used in the coming years. If these funds are reallocated to the Business Relief Fund, Prosper Portland may potentially have less funding available for future economic development programming funded by Enterprise Zone resources than planned over the five-year forecast depending on the repayment schedule of the loans.

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RISK ASSESSMENT

There is a risk that Business Relief Fund loan pool borrowers will not repay their loans; staff have mitigated this risk by providing a five-year term at zero percent interest to give businesses ample time to increase revenues and meet the repayment timeline.
